Canadians like to Travel with their Pets

As the busy summer travel season approaches, millions of Canadians are planning to load up the car (and their pets) to head for vacation destinations across the country. Yet, the prospect of a road trip or hotel stay can spark fear and panic in even the most docile pooch or kitty, leading to destructive behaviors that may disturb other passengers or harm the pet. Much can be done, however, to smooth out the trip once owners are equipped with the right knowledge.

ADAPT YOUR PET TO THE CAR

Before embarking on the long car ride, get your pet comfortable with being in a vehicle. To do this, take your cat or dog for short rides around the neighborhood. This will help you determine if your pet has a problem with motion sickness or is excessively nervous while traveling, and will allow you time to talk to your vet before the trip. There are several products that help eliminate stress-related behavior associated travel with unfamiliar surroundings.

Consider the use of a carrier or harness for your pet when traveling. There are several varieties of crates, barriers or harnesses that will limit movement or escape of your pet from the vehicle. An excited or anxious dog could cause a dangerous distraction while an owner is driving. In fact, one of the most common and preventable causes for vehicular accidents is the driver's distraction because of moving objects, such as a pet in the vehicle.

CONSISTENCY IS KEY

Like people, pets like the predictability of keeping a schedule. Therefore, owners should keep a consistent schedule once they're on the road. Limit feeding to the normal feeding times, usually first thing in the morning at least one hour before leaving and in the evening when the day's drive is done. Also, keep fresh water in the car to ensure that they are hydrated throughout the journey. Be sure to bring any necessary medicines, veterinary records and emergency contacts, and maintain regular medication schedules. Additionally, prepare to stop often, giving your pet a break every few hours. For cats, owners should pack a litter box and litter to also use during breaks or in the hotel at night. Pet owners should also be mindful of the dangers of leaving their pets unattended in the car. Temperatures inside a vehicle can rise quickly, leading to heat stroke. If you have no choice and your pet must stay in the car, lock the vehicle with the motor and air conditioning running.

SELECT THE "PURR-FECT" HOTEL

Finding a hotel that not only allows your pet but welcomes it should not be difficult. Last year, \$2.5 billion was spent on pet services including grooming and pet boarding. Also, by bringing along your pet's favorite toys you maintain their expected "creature comforts" and minimize the disruption in their environment. Ultimately, it is the new sights and sounds that make vacation so much fun, but for beloved pets, the road can present cause for undue stress when they're faced with chaotic routines and unfamiliar environments. The adoption of the aforementioned tips will do much to ensure not only that the trip is calm, but that fun is had by all.

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Senior Financial Abuse – Taking Action!

The Financial and Consumer Services Commission (FCNB) is working to safeguard New Brunswick's seniors and vulnerable adults from financial abuse.

Fears of age discrimination and loss of empowerment can keep seniors from speaking up when they are being abused. This can lead to social isolation, depression, anxiety and other negative side effects. FCNB released a report in June with recommendations following extensive research and consultations across the province. The recommendations are a step toward preventing financial abuse of seniors from occurring in the first place, and include:

• Legislative changes around the definition of financial abuse and protections for those who report it.

• Support for industry professionals who suspect clients may be victims of abuse.

• Educational initiatives to raise awareness of financial abuse and how to deal with it.

• Promotion of inter-agency cooperation to combat the financial abuse of seniors and other vulnerable people.

FCNB is committed to working to protect our seniors and encourages New Brunswickers to report suspected financial abuse.



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


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
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Explore Canada's Oldest Woolen Mill...

Briggs & Little woolen mill is located in York Mills, NB, since 1916. Previous to that it was called Little's Woolen Mill, and previous to that York Woolen Mills. The mill was first started in 1857 by George Lister one of the original grant holders in the Harvey area. In the 1890's it was bought by Roy Little, who ran it until 1916 when illness forced his family to move to a dryer climate. At this time the business was bought by Mathew Briggs and Howard Little, giving it the name it has today and carried on by these two gentlemen until the sudden passing of Mr. Briggs left half ownership to his son Russell who continued on with Howard Little until 1948, Russell sold his share to life long employee Ward Little.

Ward Little and Howard Little carried on as partners until 1954 when Roy Little (Howards son) became Ward Little's new partner. Ward and Roy ran the mill from 1954 until 1978 when Ward sold his shares to Grandson, John Thompson and Roy sold half of his shares to his son John. In 1988 John Thompson and John Little became the sole owners of Briggs & Little, and remain so today.

Some interesting historical facts about Briggs & Little:

It has been re-built each time after 4 fires. The most recent being in 1994. The first colors other than white, grey and black where introduced in the 1940's and included Scarlet, Blue and Paddy Green.
The mill was partially powered by water until 1994. Ward Little worked over 60 years at the mill.

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





Mac Tips: A Look at the "Mac" Dock...

The Dock is the bar of icons that sits at the bottom or side of your screen. It provides easy access to some of the applications on your Mac (such as Mail, Safari, Contacts and QuickTime Players), displays which applications are currently running, and holds windows in their minimized state. It's also the place to find the Trash (its icon looks like a waste basket). For your convenience, you can add your own applications, files, and folders to the Dock too.

To select an item in the Dock, simply click its icon. For example, if you want to listen to some music, click the iTunes icon (the icon with music notes) to open iTunes. When an application is running, the Dock displays an illuminated dash or a black dot beneath the application's icon. To make any currently running application the active one, click its icon in the Dock to switch to it (the active application's name appears in the menu bar to the right of the Apple logo).

As you open applications (or open files to launch applications), their respective icons appear in the Dock, even if they weren't there originally. That means if you've got a lot of applications open, your Dock will grow substantially. If you minimize a window (click the round, yellow button in the upper-left corner of any window), the window gets pulled down into the Dock and waits until you click this icon to bring up the window again.

The Dock keeps applications on its left side, while Stacks and minimized windows are kept on its right. If you look closely, you'll see a vertical separator line that separates them. If you want to rearrange where the icons appear within their line limits, just drag a docked icon to another location on the Dock and drop it.

The separator line in the Dock separates the application icons from Stacks and minimized windows.

When you quit an application whose icon resides in the Dock (such as Safari or Mail), the illuminated dash or black dot disappears, but the icon remains. When you quit an application whose icon doesn't reside in the Dock (for example, you just finished playing Chess), its icon disappears from the Dock.

Tip: Control-click or right-click a Dock item to see a contextual menu of additional choices.

Adding and removing Dock items

EXERCISE: If you want to add an application to the Dock, click the Launchpad icon in the Dock and drag the application icon to the Dock; the icons in the Dock will move aside to make room for the new one.

EXERCISE: If you want to add a file or folder to the Dock, just drag its icon from any Finder window (or the desktop) and drop it on the Dock. The resulting icon that appears in the Dock is actually an alias of the original item (it's kind of a pointer to your original item). If you drag an application or file onto the Dock, you'll be able to open it anytime by simply clicking its docked icon. If you drag a folder onto the Dock, a Finder window of the folder's contents will display when you click the folder icon in the Dock.

EXERCISE: To remove an item from the Dock, drag its icon an inch or more off the Dock and wait a couple seconds, then release; the icon will disappear in a poof of smoke. There are some icons that you can't remove from the Dock, such as the Trash and the Finder. Don't worry, you aren't permanently removing the item from your computer; you simply got rid of its Dock icon. If you want that item back in the Dock, locate the application, file, or folder in the Finder (or with Spotlight), and drag it back into the Dock.

Tip: You can change where the Dock displays and customize its animation style in Dock preferences.

The program also offers hair and foot care, transportation and health care monitoring on issues such as medication, blood pressure, blood sugar levels, dressing changes and general health status. Anyone is able to make referrals to the Adult Day Program including the individual, caregiver, family member or health professionals. Financial Subsidies may be available through the Department of Social Development or Veteran's Affairs.



The Kings Way LifeCare Alliance <u>Adult Day Centre</u> in Quispamsis, is designed to support adults who wish to stay in their own homes and remain as independent as possible, for as long as possible.

The Centre provides support with activities of daily living and can assist people who are socially isolated, frail or living with the early stages of dementia. The program also provides relief for caregivers so that they can continue to care for their loved ones at home.

Program Activities:

Activities are based on each person's preferences. Current activities included: Art, gardening, cooking, music, entertainment, exercise programs, walking club etc.

It can be a difficult time when you or a family member experience a loss of sight. Fortunately, Vision Loss Rehabilitation New Brunswick a CNIB organization – is here to help.

Our specialists will work with you, your ophthalmologist, optometrist and other health care professionals to create a vision loss rehabilitation plan that meets your needs and goals - and helps you get back to a fulfilling life. Your plan may include one or more of the following services:

Low vision services – If you have low vision, learning to use the sight you have left can be life changing. Our specialists can provide information about your eye disease and explain how it affects vision in an easy-to-understand way and teach you how to use lighting and colour contrast to maximize your remaining vision. Our low vision specialists help to use low vision devices for everyday tasks like reading small print on medications and food packages, to reading personal mail, newspapers, phone numbers and recipes, to watching TV, to reading street signs and bus numbers.

Essential skills for daily living – Our specialists can help you build the skills you need to live safely and independently with vision loss. This may include helping you learn safe methods of pouring a cup of coffee, preparing a meal and using household appliances. They will help you discover simple techniques for labelling medications, identifying money, using the phone and organizing household items and learn how to use large-print, braille and audio products, and adaptive technology as a part of day-today life.

Orientation and mobility instruction – Learning to travel independently with vision loss is an essential skill. Our certified specialists can help you learn to travel safely and independently. They teach people to navigate their home property, find and cross intersections, navigate new environments like a workplace or education campus. They help people regain independence by riding public transit with confidence to reach community resources like grocery stores, banks and shopping malls.

Adjustment to vision loss – Counselling is critical to people coming to terms with their vision loss, understanding and dealing with their emotions, and accepting the support and training that will allow them to live independent, active, lives. This includes assistance with finding community programs, financial subsidies and other helpful resources available in your local area. A structured eight-week adjustment to vision loss program facilitated by a trained professional helps form connections to others who can share similar experiences and advice on adapting to vision loss.

2 Confirm your diagnosis

Once you receive a diagnosis from an eye care professional, ask for your prognosis and treatment to be explained.

3 Ask about Vision Loss Rehabilitation (VLR)

If sight loss has made everyday tasks difficult, ask to be referred to Vision Loss Rehabilitation New Brunswick (a CNIB organization).

4 Explore your options

Share your story with specialists at your local VLR/CNIB office. Choose services, designed to meet your needs, that will enable you to be independent, safe, and active.

5 Keep in touch

Visit your eye care professional regularly. Stay in contact with your VLR team who will be there if your sight or your life circumstance changes.

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Every Garden looks Better when Cleanly Weeded...


Summertime is a more relaxed season for the gardener (or the homeowner in charge of taking care of the property if you don't consider yourself a gardener!) Any planting should be long done by now, and those plants growing, blooming, or turning into vegetables for the table. Your duty list is reduced now, and the urgency far less (if you have been timely and diligent enough thus far!) All that should be left now is to be on watch for new weeds and keep the lawns and gardens watered if this dry weather persists. Those two items illustrate the value

of timely intervention so perfectly. It is like that in gardening, as it is in so many aspects of life (vehicle maintenance, house maintenance, human body maintenance ...!) Let's talk

watering first. Plants soon begin to suffer



and show it when all the free water in their root zone disappears. Any shrubs or trees that were planted as potted stock this spring should be watered occasionally during dry weather throughout their first season. It takes a while for them to grow a significant amount of roots outside their original small root ball that fit into the pot they were grown in. Most are grown under daily irrigation at the nursery, and are dependent on a fair amount of soil moisture to keep from wilting. So even though it might have sprinkled rain on a given day, and you don't think about watering, that soil ball likely didn't benefit from the small amount of rain at all, and will need your full blast of the hose to stay well hydrated. As a garden center owner with a five year guarantee on trees and shrubs, I know that the main cause of shrub failure during the first summer is lack of consistent watering. The same applies if you dig and divide perennials, or transplant anything in your garden. It does pay to dig carefully and get as large an intact root system as possible. Bottom line...keep the root system moist.





Lawns begin to turn brown quite often this time of year. We haven't had measurable rain in over two weeks as I write this, and I can see the green waning from local lawns. The same rule

applies...keep the soil moist. Watering in the evening or early morning as less is lost to evaporation. You only need the soil to be moistoverwatering is just a waste. A sprinkler in position for 30 minutes should be plenty for most lawns, less time if you are doing it weekly.

Likewise with weeding- an ounce of prevention... Once you have the beds cleanly weeded, don't hang up the hoe for the summer. Stay on watch (from your rocking chair with a cool one, that still counts) and a couple weeks after the main weeding, walk back through quickly scraping any new green seedlings or weed sprouts. On a sunny

day they will quickly die and shrivel up, and you can cover the whole garden in a quick easy session, in comparison with struggling with masses of foot-tall weeds if you let it go. No garden looks better than when cleanly weeded, and conversely, worse if clouded with weeds.



I don't mean to mess up your summer with worry or work. It's just that it feels so good when you stay on top of things!
